Hello DAC Members and Happy Fall Fishing!

As we wind down the year, it is with pride and joy that we reflect on the activities and performance of the club for 2018.

2018 Fishing – As with most years, this year witnessed some great fishing in some species, weaker in others. Certainly the highlight of our current fishery is the abundance of big Bluefin Tuna. After an absence of almost 70 years, it appears that they are back for an extended period now three years running and counting. They certainly are not easy to catch but just having them here in such size and numbers is truly rewarding. Our pelagic species remain strong with the warmer waters and we continue to see good counts of Dorado, Yellowfin tuna and Marlin. Yellowtail, White Sea Bass and Halibut on the other hand seem less abundant and more elusive but still fun targets for those that invest the time and effort; especially in the slower winter and early spring months. Sadly, our albacore fishery seems all but lost given the changes in the environment we have seen over the years – but perhaps they too will return someday like the Bluefin tuna have. One thing is for sure - next year will bring more changes and surprises! Overall I would classify it as a very good year, but not an exceptional one as we had during the El Niño of 2015.

Membership has made some great progress this year as we added 14 new memberships to the club. Participation is everything for the club so I hope all members can do their part to help make the club great again! I am proud that we had such good participation at our events this year: the annual Awards Banquet, our General Membership meetings and the DAC boat show! Events take a lot of effort to put together and are really fun for the

members - we really want everyone to attend if at all possible!!! I feel like we had some great guest speakers for our membership meetings and we are always looking for new input and ideas that make these activities fun and informative for all.

In addition, we have revitalized the Reel Times publications and continue to make improvements to our website and general communications.

It has been an honor and a pleasure to serve on the Board of Directors for the past 4 years....I hope we can get more of you involved as we look forward to electing new board members for 2019.

Our club has a long and rich history and I want to thank you again for making the DAC such a successful and reputable Angling Club here in Southern California.



Fishing Report

As of September 20, 2018

Our coastal water remains off color and warm with no life. Offshore waters are clean, but mid-channel they turn off colored further offshore and around the islands This extends from the coast to the ridge (14, 267, 209, 277). SW of the 181/182 the water is clean. Water Temps ranging from the Low to mid 70's along coast



Lunar Cycle: New Moon September 9th and Full Moon on September 24th

Catalina: Water Temps staying near upper 60's to low 70's around the island. Bluefin Tuna are being seen along Backside. Marlin released last weekend off East End / Backside (tight to the island). It's worth trolling jigs while travailing around this area.

San Clemente: Larger sized Bluefin are moving around the backside of SCI. Both Sporties and privates are working off the Backside of Clemente for the tunas. Before you go, make to check the Navy website for closure dates and times.

Nearshore / Coastal: Slower fishing, not many reports. Still worth a try along kelp line Newport Art. Reef, Crystal Cove, Salt Creek, Dana Point, San Mateo, San Onofre, Barn Kelp and La Jolla.....

Offshore: It's time to go offshore!!! There are local kelp paddies still holding some Dorado, Tuna and Yellowtail. Need to find the right kelp paddy. Check the blue water below 209. Yellowfin and Bluefin Tuna are

still to the south. Marlin around Catalina – East End and Local Banks (267 to 14). There is still plenty of time to get out and find these fish. The marlin have been along the hard Chlorophyll and Temperature breaks.

MABT Update

The Dana Angling Club fielded 8 teams for this year's Balboa Angling Club's Master Angler Billfish Tournament. There were 5 Clubs represented, with 39 boats and 172 Anglers participating. Two Boats from the Dana Angling Club caught fish, A REEL DREAM with Mitchell Firestein catching two 30# jig fish and HOOKED catching two - Geoff Hersch on 20# and G.J. Sacco on 16#. Mitchell Firestein placed 3rd in the Master High Angler Category. The concentration of fish was local at the East End of Catalina, the 14 mile bank and the 267. JEFE found the fish on the 267 on Thursday pre-fishing. After Friday's roll call the entire tournament fleet ended up on the 267 on Saturday. There were 49 hookups & 27 releases overall, with lots of action. Over 50 boats were pounding the 267 for Marlin. Mia Tia, a club boat, but not in the tournament was flying a marlin catch flag on the way in as well. While the Club didn't place this year, we had a good showing and were well represented. The best part was the fish were 8 to 10 miles off Dana Point for the tournament, back in the slip every night. Looking forward to next year.

Bluefin Labor Day Weekend Recap

So here we go. Plan was to fish the bluefin grounds early Saturday morning. Have a good friend, Logan, who insisted we get to SCI super early and try to make some flyers. We had 1 pack of frozen flyers but I didnt realize how much bigger our flyers are around here.

Same plan changes and we plan to leave Friday night. By the time we load the boat with all the gear it's about 1130 pm. I love fishing this big stuff. We had a Talica 50, Tiagra 80, and Makaira 80, helium tank, balloons, kite, frozen flying fish, bridle needle, and way too many other things we don't need!

Head to the bait barge and get a good mix of sardine and macs. There were a lot of macs and good size so we didn't have to spend any time to make bait. Off we go...

It's me, friend-Logan, Bryan-never stops talking I'm sure many of you know him by now, and Seth-visiting from Louisiana.

We get to the island about 345 am. Start at white rock and work east looking for this damn flying fish. Underwater lights on sat for a bit and nothing. So then turned the spot light on and looked around. Sure enough we find a couple skipping and a sea lion chasing

them. One comes behind the boat and stops in the light. We scoop it with our long net. Another one hits the boat and knocks itself out but the sea lion gets it before we can. We kept looking but not much more action and we wanted to get to the fishing grounds before sunlight.

We come around pyramid head and of course there's like 50 halogen lights in the distance. So much boat traffic! I knew it was gonna be busy but you gotta go when you can!

The wind was down but the seas a little stirred up and still decent swell which wasn't too fun when drifting.

I had dropped a pin all the spots we had marked tuna volume a few weeks ago and really these fish haven't moved they hang out in the same spots. Most the boats were south east of the island. We slid in on the western edge of them. I will try to attach the map so you can see the spots.

Its about 5 am and still dark. I bridle up a mac and send it down 150' with a rubber band sinker. We also send down a squid on a rubber band sinker.

10 minutes goes by and my mac gets bit. Fish is peeling off line from the Talica 50 on 130 braid, game on! I give

the rod to my friend from Louisiana as this is the best California welcome I can think of. I'm yelling to my friend Logan to reel in his line so we don't get a tangle and he quickly gets bit.

Oh man we have a double. All I can think about is this is trouble and we could lose both fish. I set Seth up in the harness and tell him to follow his fish but try to stay away from Logan.

Meanwhile Logan has his fish on his Makaira 80 and bent butt just fighting it from the gunnel and its coming up pretty quick. They get it to the boat within 15 min and we get a gaff in it. Tapes out to #100 lbs.

I look over at Seth in the harness and his line is going straight under the boat. Yikes. I take the rod and try to swing it around the transom but its stuck. I try to use our long net to push the line down underwater to free it but no luck. I put the reel in free spool as I'm worried it's gonna break if anymore tension on it. This fish is swimming out to sea and we are losing a ton of line.

Seth is an avid spearfisherman and wants to jump in the water. Not usually a great idea since dark out and swell as the boat is going up and down. But we went for it. He puts his mask on and fins. Jumps in the water and comes up and asks for an underwater flashlight. Ah nope. He goes back under and sees the line is wrapped around the prop and just peeling off. It's amazing it didn't break. Somehow he is able to get it around the prop without breaking and our line shoots back behind the boat.

He gets back in grabs the rod and off we go. We were worried the line was gonna have a weak spot so we didn't put too much drag on. I started backing down the boat to get more line back. This was the fun part. With so many boats around we were going by boats backwards fighting this fish. It must have been a site.

We finally get this fish up and down and we are convinced any weak line is on the reel. We start putting some more pressure on the fish. Use the boat a bit to get it up and finally to gaff. This one comes over the rail and tapes out at #150. Not the 200 lbs. monsters but we landed both of them and it's not even 6 am.

Rest of the day was long and rocky. We metered some big schools. We had them under the boat and nothing. Put the balloon out with the flyer and had a big Mako steel our bait.


Lots of boat traffic and towards the evening more sport boats coming out. We thought it was gonna happen in the evening as we had great meter marks, had mac and squid out, and occasional flat fall but nothing. These fish seem to have a window when they want to eat and you just never know.

Called it a day as everyone was tired and the rocking from the swell was getting to everyone!

I will say the volume of bait fish was almost non-existent compared to a month ago. These fish are gonna start biting really good and then take off. If you can go I think the time is now. The bite has been early-early or late-late so pick one to be at or both! Pretty technical fishing with the balloons, kites, etc... but we were still able to get them the old fashion way. Didn't even skip the yummee.

Anyway go get 'em, I think the time is now. Hope everyone is having a great season!

Many billfish and pelagics are many being seen and caught locally. Fishing is THE BEST way of socializing so go out and give it your best shot. 
